Keeping Schools Safe: Bipartisan Safer Communities Act Grants and Programs

Climate resiliency for low-income households

Last month, the Biden-Harris Administration [announced plans](#) to support the renovation of low-income homes with zero energy and climate resilient technology and cut the cost of decarbonizing housing through programs within the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), U.S. Department of Treasury, and U.S. Department of Energy set up within in the Inflation Reduction Act.

Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) Grants Program (Dept. of Transportation)

Info: Provides state, local, and Tribal governments funding to leverage technology to create safer, more equitable, efficient, and innovative transportation systems.

Consumer Electronics Battery Recycling, Reprocessing, and Battery Collection (Dept. of Energy)

Info: This Funding Opportunity Announcement will provide funding to support the recycling of consumer electronics batteries and battery-containing devices to help build a robust domestic critical material supply chain for EV batteries in the United States. The program will accomplish this by: 1) Increasing participation by consumers in recycling programs; 2) Improving the economics of consumer battery recycling to create a market for recycling, including battery recycling research, development, and demonstration activities to create innovative and practical approaches to increase the reuse and recycling of batteries; and 3) Increasing the number of these programs, including state and local programs to assist in the establishment or enhancement of state consumer electronics battery collection, recycling, and reprocessing programs and to establish collection points at retailers.

Closing: November 29, 2023

Wood Products Infrastructure Assistance Program (Dept. of Agriculture)

Info: Provides financial assistance to facilities that purchase and process byproducts from ecosystem restoration projects in areas at risk of unnaturally severe wildfire or insect or disease infestation. The intent is to substantially decrease the cost of conducting restoration projects involving vegetation removal on federal and Tribal lands and invest in surrounding communities. These ecosystem restoration byproducts could include trees and woody biomass harvested through timber sales, thinning, hazardous fuels reduction treatments, or other restoration management activities.

Applicants: State, local, and Tribal governments, school districts, nonprofits, institutions of

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higher education, special purpose districts
Closing: December 1, 2023

Rail Vehicle Replacement Grant Program (RAIL) (Dept of Transportation)

Info: The Rail Vehicle Replacement Program makes funding available competitively to help fund capital projects to replace rail rolling stock. For the purposes of this program, rail rolling stock is defined as revenue service, passenger carrying vehicles, or propulsion (locomotives) vehicles necessary for the provision of rail public transportation.

Applicants: State, local and Tribal governments

Closing: December 18, 2023

Small Business Innovation Research Program (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and Dept. of Commerce)

Info: The NOAA SBIR program seeks proposals for highly innovative products and services that have strong commercial potential and fit within the NOAA mission areas: extreme events and cascading hazards, coastal resilience, changing oceans, water availability, quality, and risk, effects of space weather, and monitoring and modeling for climate change mitigation.

Applicants: Small businesses

Closing: December 20, 2023

National Estuarine Research Reserve System (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration)

Info: Goal is to protect and restore ecologically significant habitats, including lands that play a critical role in helping communities become more resilient to natural hazards. Eligible uses are for habitat restoration, habitat restoration planning, engineering, and design, and ecosystem conservation.

Closing: January 10, 2024

National Sea Grant: Marine Debris Community Action Coalitions (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration)

Info: This funding opportunity will support the creation of coalitions and partnerships among communities, groups, and localities, especially those that have been traditionally underserved, to address various marine debris challenges.

Closing: March 5, 2024

Marine Debris Interception Technologies (Dept. Of Commerce)

Info: Goal is to support marine debris removal through the deployment and management of proven debris interception technologies throughout the coastal United States, Great Lakes, territories, and freely associated states, including in Tribal and underserved communities. The overall objective of this funding opportunity is to support the installation, monitoring, and maintenance of proven marine debris interception technologies that will capture marine debris at or close to known marine debris sources or pathways and which benefit marine and coastal NOAA trust resources, coastal communities, and/or local economies.

Applicants: Local, state, and Tribal governments, higher education institutions, nonprofits, for profit institutions within the marine debris field

Closing: March 15, 2024

National Sea Grant: Marine Debris Challenge (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration)

Info: This competition will support innovative research to application (R2A) projects that will address the prevention and/or removal of marine debris and provide the potential for transformational behavior change. Planning and capacity building activities are allowed but must

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accompany subsequent implementation activities; the end result of these projects cannot be solely academic or non-tangible outputs (e.g., scientific publications, awareness/training). A strong application will clearly outline how the project will produce new and effective deliverables that change the landscape for marine debris prevention and/or removal.

Closing: March 27, 2024

Carbon Utilization Procurement Grants under Bipartisan Infrastructure (Dept. of Energy)

Info: The overall objective of the planned Funding Opportunity Announcement is to support DOE's current vision of the Carbon Utilization Procurement Grants Program which will illustrate that several incumbent products can be replaced or supplemented with alternatives that are derived from the conversion of anthropogenic carbon oxides, demonstrating that significant net reductions in greenhouse gas emissions are possible. These grants will illustrate that more sustainable alternatives are viable and will promote the deployment of these products even after the grant ends.

Applicants: Local and state governments

Closing: April 30, 2024

Industrial Demonstrations Program (Dept. of Energy)

Info: Program will fund projects that focus on the highest emitting and hardest to abate industries where decarbonization technologies can have the greatest impact: iron and steel, cement and concrete, chemicals and refining, food and beverage, paper and forest products, aluminum, other energy-intensive manufacturing industries and cross-cutting technologies.

Applicants: State and local governments, technology developers, industry manufacturers, universities, national laboratories, engineering and construction firms, environmental groups, and community-based organizations

Closing: Open until funding is expended

Building Codes Implementation for Efficiency & Resilience Program (Dept. Of Energy)

Info: \$45 million in competitive grants to help states and partnering organizations implement updated building energy codes and lower energy bills for American families and businesses.

Applicants: State and local governments

Closing: Available until account is expended

Carbon Capture Large-Scale Pilots (Dept. of Energy)

Info: This funding opportunity includes up to \$820 million for up to 10 projects focused on de-risking transformational carbon capture technologies and catalyzing significant follow-on investments for commercial-scale demonstrations on carbon emission sources across the power and industrial sectors. New carbon capture technologies are emerging from the past two decades of research and development and the next step is testing them at larger scales to help attract the capital necessary for their demonstration and deployment. Funding for this program will provide the support needed to test these novel technologies under relevant conditions in both the power and industrial sectors.

Applicants: Technology Developers, Industry, Utilities, Universities, National Laboratories, Engineering and Construction firms, State and Local Governments, Tribal, Environmental Groups, and Community Based Organizations.

Closing: Available until account is expended

Carbon Capture Demonstration Projects Program (Dept. of Energy)

Info: This funding opportunity includes up to \$1.7 billion for approximately six projects to

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demonstrate commercial-scale carbon capture technologies integrated with CO₂ transportation and geologic storage infrastructure. This program focuses on funding demonstration projects that can be readily replicated and deployed at power plants and major industrial sources of carbon emissions, such as cement, pulp and paper, iron, and steel.

Applicants: Technology Developers, Industry, Utilities, Universities, National Laboratories, Engineering and Construction firms, State and Local Governments, Tribal, Environmental Groups, and Community Based Organizations.

Closing: Available until account is expended

Challenges and Opportunities at the Interface of Wind, Energy and Radar Technology (Dept. of Energy)

Info: The purpose of this RFI is to solicit public feedback to help inform DOE's implementation of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, also commonly known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). To help inform DOE's implementation of BIL funds under the provision referenced above, this RFI seeks input on: 1) Siting challenges of wind energy developers related to radar interference, 2) Potential mitigation technologies at the radar and/or turbine level that currently exist or are in development to address wind turbine-radar interference, 3) Commercialization and market adoption of wind-radar interference mitigation measures, and what obstacles need to be overcome to accelerate commercialization and maximize adoption and 4) BIL Provisions and Requirements and Buy America Requirements.

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) FAA Contract (Dept. of Transportation)

Info: The DOT and FAA announces the opportunity to apply for \$20 million in FY 2024 Airport Infrastructure Grant funds for the FCT competitive grant program. The purpose of the FCT competitive grant program is to make annual grants available to eligible airports for airport-owned airport traffic control tower (ATCT) projects that address the aging infrastructure of the nation's airports. The FAA will consider ATCT projects that sustain, construct, repair, improve, rehabilitate, modernize, replace, or relocate non-approach control towers; or acquire and install air traffic control, communications, and related equipment to be used in those towers; or construct a remote tower certified by the FAA including acquisition and installation of air traffic control, communications, or related equipment.

Applicants: Any public agency, private entity, state agency, Indian Tribe or Pueblo owning a public-use National Plan of Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS) airport, the Secretary of the Interior for Midway Island airport, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Republic of Palau.

FY24 IIJA/IRA Bureau of Land Management Oregon/Washington (ORWA) Forest and Woodlands Resource Management (Dept. of the Interior)

Applicants: Private, Public, and State institutions of higher education, Public Housing Authorities, Nonprofits, Tribal Governments and Organizations, City or township Governments, Special district governments, Independent School Districts, and County Governments.

Closing: February 26th, 2024.

Bridge Investment Program (Dept. Of Transportation)

Info: The Bridge Investment Program is a competitive, discretionary program that focuses on existing bridges to reduce the overall number of bridges in poor condition, or in fair condition at risk of falling into poor condition. It also expands applicant eligibilities to create opportunity for all levels of government to be direct recipients of program funds. Alongside states and federal lands management agencies, metropolitan planning organizations and local and tribal governments can also apply directly to FHWA, making it easier to advance projects at the local level that meet community needs.

Community Wood Energy and Wood Innovation Program (Dept. of Agriculture)

Info: Directly supports the installation of thermally led community wood energy systems or development and expansion of innovative wood product facilities. The intent of the CWEWIP is to support forest health and stimulate local economies by expanding renewable wood energy use and innovative wood products manufacturing capacity. This funding opportunity is intended for shovel ready projects that will not require additional funding or time to complete after the award period. Examples of eligible projects include, but are not limited to: 1) Install a thermally led community wood energy system for heating, cooling, and/or electricity that replaces fossil

Coastal Habitat Restoration & Resilience Grants for Tribes & Underserved Communities (Dept. Of Commerce)

Info: Projects that are most responsive to the program priorities will be more competitive. Potential activities include: 1) Capacity building, which may include (but is not limited to) participation in municipal or regional-scale resilience planning, project planning and feasibility studies, stakeholder engagement, proposal development for future funding, and outreach and education, as well as hiring of staff to increase capacity to support the planning, design and implementation of restoration actions, as well as capacity to support overall award management including tracking, reporting, and project coordination/development; 2) actionable science support, such as the collection and/or analysis of climate, habitat or other community- or conservation-related data that informs planning and decision making and/or future restoration actions of tribes, tribal entities, and/or underserved communities; and/or 3) restoration project activities, including for demonstration projects, which may include engineering and design, permitting, on-the-ground restoration, and pre- and post-project implementation monitoring. Competitive applications will directly benefit tribes or underserved communities. Applicants may apply for funding to support one or more of these activities.

Green and Resilient Retrofit Program - Elements (Dept. of Housing & Urban Development)

Info: The program seeks to amplify recent technological advancements in utility efficiency and energy generation, bring a new focus on preparing for climate hazards by reducing residents' and properties' exposure to hazards, and protecting life, livability, and property when disaster strikes. GRRP is the first HUD program to simultaneously invest in energy efficiency, energy generation, and climate resilience strategies specifically in HUD-assisted multifamily housing. All of the investments under the GRRP will be made in affordable housing communities serving low-income families in alignment with the Administration's Justice 40 goals. Awards made under this FOA will be funded, in whole or in part, with funds appropriated by Section 50152 of the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA) – Grants to Facilitate the Siting of Interstate Electricity Transmission Lines.

Green and Resilience Retrofit Program – Leading Edge Modification Development (Dept. of Housing & Urban Development)

Neighborhood Access & Equity (NAE) Grant Program (Dept. of Transportation)

Info: Goal is to provide funds for projects that improve walkability, safety, and affordable transportation access through context-sensitive strategies and address existing transportation facilities that create barriers to community connectivity or negative impacts on the human or natural environment, especially in disadvantaged or underserved communities. The program also provides funding for planning and capacity building activities in disadvantaged or underserved communities as well as funding for technical assistance to units of local government to facilitate efficient and effective contracting, design, and project delivery and to build capacity for delivering surface transportation projects. Application is combined with the Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods (RCN) program from the Investment in Infrastructure & Jobs Act.

Applicants: State, local, and Tribal governments, metropolitan planning organizations, nonprofit organizations, institutions of higher education

Environmental Justice Grants

Info: Multiple Environmental Justice Grant opportunities offered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Includes pollution prevention, tree canopies, emerging contaminants, supporting small communities and more.

Investing in Clean Energy for Rural America (Dept. Of Agriculture)

Description: USDA will announce ~\$1.45B in new Inflation Reduction Act funding for the REAP program, which is an existing program created in the 2002 Farm Bill. It provides guaranteed loan financing and grant funding to agricultural producers and rural small businesses for renewable energy systems or to make energy efficiency improvements. The program provides guaranteed loan financing and grant funding to agricultural producers and rural small businesses for renewable energy systems or to make energy efficiency improvements. Agricultural producers may also apply for new energy efficient equipment and new system loans for agricultural production and processing.

Funding to Address Air Pollution at Schools

Info: To provide funding for grants and other activities to monitor and reduce pollution and greenhouse gas emissions at schools in low-income and disadvantaged communities. To provide technical assistance to schools in low-income and disadvantaged communities to develop school air and environmental quality plans and to identify and mitigate ongoing air pollution hazards.

Applicants: State, local, Tribal agencies, not for profit organizations and others for projects supporting schools in low-income and disadvantaged communities.

Closing: To remain available until September 30, 2031

Renew America's Nonprofits (Dept. Of Energy)

Info: The Renew America's Nonprofits program—referred to in President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law as the Energy Efficiency Materials Pilot Program—will reduce carbon emissions, improve health and safety, and lower utilities costs at buildings owned and operated by 501(c)(3) nonprofits, allowing critical funds to be redirected to mission focused work

Closing: Available until expended

Industrial Demonstration Program (Dept. of Energy)

Info: The Industrial Demonstrations Program will fund projects that focus on the highest emitting and hardest to abate industries where decarbonization technologies can have the greatest impact: iron and steel, cement and concrete, chemicals and refining, food and beverage, paper and forest products, aluminum, other energy-intensive manufacturing industries and cross-cutting technologies.
