The state of roads in Washington today

Driving on deteriorated roads costs drivers 53.9 billion a year

On average, each WA driver pays 649 a year in costs due to driving on roads in need of repair

Our WA interstate highways are some of the busiest in the nation, ranking 9th in the U.S. for highest daily travel, yet 57% of our interstate highways are in poor condition.


Congresswoman Suzan DelBene has consistently championed increased infrastructure funding to address our deteriorating roads. DelBene helped advance critical legislation, like the bipartisan infrastructure law and American Rescue Plan, which will provide necessary funds to improve our roads and interstate highways.

The bipartisan infrastructure law will deliver over

## \$4 billion

to WA over the next 5 years.

The funding will be allocated by the Washington State Legislature and can be used for the construction, reconstruction, and improvement of the roads that Washingtonians rely on every day.



Roads like the

## **SR-522** Corridor

which connects King and Snohomish counties, and



## Woodinville SR-202

which connects eastern King County cities, are good examples of projects that could benefit from this funding.

DelBene also helped secure \$7.1 billion in funding through the American Rescue Plan for transportation and infrastructure improvement projects in Washington.
